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Overview



The 32nd CAPACOA conference was held in Ottawa from November 13 to 17, 2019.

The event was entitled: Opening Up and this theme was explored throughout the 3 day event.

The conference saw 230 delegates in attendance.

The event had 14 artists take part in the <u>showcases</u> held in venues across Ottawa and Quebec. And 5 artists take part in the pitch program.

With 12 <u>Professional development sessions</u>, some of these were a 3 part conversation spread along the event. A first for CAPACOA and that ended being a great success.

Comments from delegates

This is the only national platform for presenters, artists, agents and managers to come together to discuss difficult issues that are real and urgent for our sector. I feel the questions are now slowly starting to be answered, or at the very least we are exploring the edges of the answers. I think the spaces have become safer for our disenfranchised colleagues to be welcomed, and encouraged to speak their truths to people willing to listen, and I hope, to make change. This is where the work is going to get even more difficult, and I believe CAPACOA is capable of continuing to provide the leadership and spaces we need to continue the work.

Showcases

The 32nd Annual CAPACOA Conference had a total of 14 artists perform as part of the showcase program plus 5 artists as part of a pitch program.

Most artists were selected through an application and jury process but some were selected by our curation committee: Heather Redfern, Clothilde Cardinal and Mark Hammond. Denise Bolduc curated and programmed the opening show and the 2 pitch programs.

There were a total of 10 music showcases, 3 dance / performance showcases and 1 theatre piece presented.

Exhibit Hall



For the second time this year, CAPACOA worked with a committee of agents to design the exhibit hall. The timing, the table sizes and costs and other elements were reviewed and discussed.

Unfortunately, the timing of the exhibit hall periods as well as the idea to have lunch served at the same time as one period did not please the exhibitors / delegates. We will continue to work on these issues and possibly revising the entire exhibit hall concept.

Here are comments from participants:

- 'Mixing with lunch or drink is not respecting the efforts of agents to connect with presenters- no one showed in last hour and first hour people were eating such a waste of time and money'
- 'I found the one on one meetings to be more effective than the Exhibit Hall. Perhaps the Exhibit Hall is no longer needed.'



Evaluation Results

We had 42 survey respondents, which is a slight decrease form last year at 47 respondents.

Conference delegates enjoyed every aspect of the logistics and, similar to the 2017 event, the hotel scored highly. But the negative comments mention the lack of space at the hotel for the exhibit hall and a feeling of being a bit tight during networking times. This shows that we may be ok to continue with the ALT for our room block but we would need to find additional spaces for some PD and possibly the one to ones and exhibit hall depending on what format we go with for 2021.

The professional development program scored a bit lower than previous years. Most sessions session ranked in the "good" range but a few collected marks of Fair and Poor. he entire program averaged 4.13 out of 5. The top three sessions were "Drivers of Arts Participation", "Wikidata" and "Radical Collaboration in a Linked Digital World".

The One to Ones meetings did not score high, the main comments were regarding the presenters not showing up – even if they had received schedules – this means this entire concept has to be rethink – the room not being prepared also was mentioned – again, this brings us back to lack of space at the ALT for this activity in particular.

The artistic programming (curated performance, juried showcases and curated pitch sessions) received a total mark of 3.8% on 5. The opening performing featuring Indigenous artists received the highest mark at 4.21%.

The Exhibit Hall received the overall mark of 46% delegates saying the experience was either Very good or Good. The main complaint was that the exhibit hall was feeling cramped and not easy to circulate. Even if this was the same setting (with fewer tables) as 2017 where the exhibit hall received higher marks this also speaks to the overall exhibit hall experience. One delegate mentioned that they preferred the one to one meetings to their experience in the exhibit hall as an exhibitor and wonders if the exhall concept should be revised or simply eliminated. The struggle to get presenters to attend the Hall was also a frequent complaint among delegates who answered the survey.

47% of the delegates said they would be very likely to recommend the conference to a friend or a colleague. No one said they would be unlikely to recommend the conference.

More than half survey respondents provided a testimonial, which is really unusual. Here are a few:

- The quality of the showcase programming was impressive. One of my best experience on this point!
- It's a great opportunity to meet presenters and learn about the industry.
- Great opportunity to participate in a conference of new ideas, engagement with indigenous artists and good networking environment in a very pleasant hotel.
- One of the best supportive, open minded, intellectually engaging conferences I have attended.

And through it all, she's a teller of stories that have impacted our past and will inform our future. acākosīk | $\triangleleft Udr'$ is the culmination of her creation and collaboration to this point. It's a collection of seven sonic explorations that not only blur lines between sources and styles, but also between the actual and the ideal, the real and imagined.

Building on the foundation of potent, cross-cultural electro-pop established on her self-titled 2013 debut and Juno-nominated, Polaris Long-Listed 2017 follow-up The Fight Within, acākosīk incorporates more intense and urgent tinges of alternative, post-rock, and even industrial. The cohesive-yet-combustible result tips a cap to modern innovators like Florence + The Machine and FKA twigs while simultaneously borrowing sounds accumulated over centuries by iskwē's Cree and Métis ancestors. Orchestral arrangements for three of the songs were debuted by iskwē and the NAC Orchestra at the NAC Golden Anniversary Gala on October 5, 2019.

Boogát is a Canadian-Mexican musician from Montreal (Qc, Canada), blending hip-hop with Latin Music styles such as Cumbia and Reggaeton. He won the Juno Award and the Félix Award for "World Music Album of the Year" for his album Neo-Reconquista, respectively, at the Juno Awards 2016 and the ADISQ 2016.

Of Paraguayan and Mexican descent, he was born in Québec City to immigrant parents and raised in the Beauport borough of the city, then moved to Montreal in 2001 where his career took off. Performing initially in French, Boogát switched to Spanish after playing with the Latin Music group Roberto Lopez Project and Electro producer Poirier; discovering a new world of possibilities that opened doors to collaborating with artists such as Frikstailers, Uproot Andy, El Hijo De La Cumbia, Radio Radio, Lido Pimienta, El Dusty, G-Flux, Sotomayor, Super San, Niña Dioz, Mati Zundel and El Remolon, amongst others.

He released his first full-length Spanish album El Dorado Sunset in 2013. The album won two Félix Awards for "Best World Music Album" and "Producer of the Year" at ADISQ 2013. He has been touring non-stop in Canada, USA, México, Argentina, UK, Germany, Netherlands, France, Czech Republic and Spain ever since. Neo-Reconquista, which includes collaborations with La Yegros, Sonido Pesa'o and Pierre Kwenders, was released in 2015.

Silla and Rise blend Inuit throat-singing and futuristic dancefloor beats. Silla are Cynthia Pitsiulak (Kimmirut, NU) and Charlotte Qamaniq (Iglulik, NU) their name comes from the Inuktitut word "Sila" meaning weather. Sila is what surrounds us; it is what connects us to our land, to the moon, sun and stars, the ocean and the air we breathe. In respecting and honouring the need to preserve Inuit culture and paying homage to our land and the strong connection to its spirituality, they experience and perform the sounds of traditional and contemporary throat songs. Rise is Ottawa's Rise Ashen, a Juno Award nominated global-grooves producer, DJ and dancer who has spent his life pursuing the intersection of traditional and futuristic music.

Silla and Rise were nominated for a Juno for Indigenous Music Album of the Year in 2017 for their self-titled Debut: Silla + Rise, as well as an Indigenous Music Award for Best Inuit, Indigenous Language, or Francophone Album. They won the Stingray Award at Mundial Festival in Montreal in 2018 and they are currently working on a second album.

Elle Márjà is a Sami multitalented artist who in recent years has distinguished herself as an artist at the major International industry festivals, as a film music composer and as a filmmaker. She is outstanding at the intersection of Yoik, electronics and indigenous music. Through her art she tells personal stories from her family background as reindeer herding. The concerts are always highly visual with an audiovisual landscape often referred to as poetic and otherworldly. Together with the producer Morten H. Pettersen they have together created a unique sound. It's cool and Arctic colored by ancient and new Yoiks.

Elle Márjá recently collaborated musically with film composer Christophe Beck (Frozen, Hangover) in the feature film "The 12th Man" (2017) by Harald Zwart. She was named "Highlight" at the Folk Alliance International festival in Kansas City in 2017 (USA). She has experience

from the Sami National Theater Beaivváš as a composer. She has also directed and produced several short films, music videos and art films. Elle Márjá has played a number of concerts and performances at festivals and events in the Nordic countries, and has experience from international scenes in the USA, Canada, Russia, Germany, Lithuania, Sweden, Guatemala, Brazil and France. 



She developed and runs the annual Talking Stick Festival along with many other programs. She has received numerous awards for her work and community work including an Honorary Doctorate of Letters from the University of the Fraser Valley and most recently the Order of Canada from the Governor-General.

Alfredo Caxaj

Since arriving in Canada in 1985 during the height of political repression in his native Guatemala, Alfredo Caxaj has truly made a difference in his adopted community of London, Ontario. Alfredo has served as the Executive and Artistic Director of the non-profit Sunfest-London Committee for Cross Cultural Arts Inc. for more than two decades. Since debuting in July 1995, SUNFEST World Music/Dance & Jazz Summer Festival(the Committee's signature free-admission festival of music, dance, crafts and cuisine from around the globe) has grown into "Canada's Premier Celebration of World Cultures" with an annual attendance of more than 200,000. 
